Signs of the Times—Yearning with the Fire of Francis By Deacon Tommy Baca '72

The world observed an intensity of emotion and zeal during this nation’s recently held presidential election. There was fervor and a passion present, the likes of which I do not remember since I was a six year old in the first grade at Sacred Heart Cathedral Grade School in Gallup, New Mexico. I can actually remember back to 1960 when Sister Mary Katherine dazzled our young eyes with posters and buttons depicting the face of the first Catholic man to be elected president of the United States.

I can’t help but reel back to the days of the little man of Assisi who had enough fire in his belly for the world as God’s creation that he could humbly walk into the tent of a sultan to bring a message of peace. His passionate fire allowed him to boldly walk into the presence of Pope Innocent III who was likely the politically strongest of all men in history. Although I must say that in spite of such worldly power, Pope Innocent III himself had the spiritual strength to recognize the heavenly powers standing behind this little man from Assisi.

This little man had a fire deep within enkindled by a source beyond our world. This fire enabled this little disheveled wisp of a man to persuade popes and sultans while forming a center of gravity so strong that thousands of men of all walks were willing to give up what they owned to follow this simple way of life, overcome obstacles, influence, and regenerate the world in the name of Christ. Francis’ tour de force was the simple truth of knowing he was not God and knowing it was not himself who was the source of such creative fire, but rather the ever present call of Christ within the cave of his soul, in the silence and desert that the world about him did not understand.

Francis of Assisi’s fire was authentic. He knew he was no Messiah. He knew who he was in relationship to God. And yet, he burned with the same fire spawned by the Holy Spirit as it once enflamed the Apostles in the Upper Room at Pentecost. Francis’ fire was so authentic that when Pope Innocent III saw the little man walk into his view, the leader of the free world then knew immedi-

ately that this man’s fire crackled and sizzled with a kind of wood that could never be expended or extinguished by any power present in this world.

If you do not feel the intensity of heat from your fire you will not take real action beyond placing responsibility on someone else’s shoulders. The authentic flame will move you to go out and do what your pocketbook says not to do. You will be moved in spite of your poverty or your fear to the bold actions of loving kindness, to help the poor, visit the incarcerated, console the sick and the dying, and hug the lepers of our world. God places in our midst the examples of the Saints like Francis, who burned with the fire of the Holy Spirit. Read Fr. Murray Bodo’s *Francis: The Journey and Dream*. Journey with Francis of Assisi to a place deep within yourself. Journey into a cave wherein the light of hope is not so much audacious and self imposed as it is persistent, burning, real, and founded on the recognition that no man of this world can save us – we must depend upon God.

St. Francis Seminary Restoration Efforts in High Gear! By Paul Landers '76 and Mike Niklas '75

About 10 years ago, the once beautiful landscape and flower gardens of St. Francis Seminary were falling into ruin. The large flower garden that previously served as a large swimming pool for students and faculty was overrun by weeds. The gazebo was deteriorating and in need of paint. The lawn in the surrounding area had not been mowed for a couple years and there were a few fallen trees as well.


With financial assistance and "sweat equity" from many alumni, we restored some of Fr. Aubert Grieser's spectacular gardens over the course of a year, installed a watering system, added statues of St. Francis and Jesus' mother Mary, placed picnic tables in the gazebo and gave it a fresh coat of paint, etc.

In recent years, we have continued to weed the main garden now and then, but our hope was that the residents would take over the regular maintenance tasks. We had nearly given up on this notion when out of the blue we heard that a relatively new resident had formed the Mercy St. Francis Garden Club, with monthly planning sessions, active fundraising, and several projects begun or already completed!

Richard Eisele is the founder of the Mercy St. Francis Garden Club. Other members of the resident steering committee are Ruth Waltermann (treasurer), Alice Hillenbrand, Ruth Lemon (secretary), Wilma Hemsath, and Norman Noe. This is their stated purpose: "To work with management to help preserve and maintain our historical building and the surrounding campus." The large, bold text at the bottom of their advertising flyer says, "For the honor and glory of God," a motto they adopted from Fr. Aubert.

The Garden Club has raised approximately \$500 via bake sales and other fundraising efforts. They have already accomplished a great deal with their meager funds, including restoration of the gazebo's concrete floor, which had been unearthed by groundhogs. During the January 2009 meeting of the Franciscan Alumni Association, the Board approved a donation of \$1,000 to this worthy cause. Alumni board member Paul Landers '76 is our liaison to the Garden Club. He has been in contact with Richard Eisele and is enlisting alumni members to help on selected "Saturday work crews." The first of these events was 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. on March 14, 2009.

This is a list of several of the Garden Club's objectives for 2009:


- *St. Francis Statue at the front door:* Clean statue and plant perennials

- *Pond in front of main building:* Clean underbrush and fallen trees from the sides of the lake and install a fountain. Winton Woods' Lake Keeper says the lake is healthy but needs circulation of water
- *Front drive - south end around the pond:* This picturesque drive has been closed for years due to fallen timber
- *Rear entrance:* Add perennial and annual plants
- *Vegetable garden behind the gym:* Add lime to ready soil for planting; residents will provide plants
- *Peace Garden:* Weeding and planting
- *Grotto:* Power wash and paint; clear surrounding grounds
- *Stone bridge:* Clear access and create a nature trail to stations of the cross

We're very interested in assisting the Mercy St. Francis Garden Club to help spruce things up for the alumni reunion/Chapter, which will be held on the grounds of the former seminary on June 27—and to help restore, preserve and beautify this wonderful place that invokes fond memories for so many of us.
