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2016 Humanitarian Awards: Gino Correa and Gilbert Schneider

There were several outstanding nominees for the Franciscan Alumni Association's annual awards. The Board had difficulty narrowing the list to fewer than three individuals, and so elected to present two Humanitarian awards and one Christian Life award.

Rick Kasper ('70) presented the Humanitarian Award to Fr. Gino Correa. He began by telling a story about the first time he met Gino at St. Fran-

Gino's sensitivity began early in Gino's life, growing up with hearing & speech disabled parents. After Gino's ordination in 1976 at St. Leonard's, it was very moving that he said his First Mass both verbally and in sign language.

Fr. Gino was first assigned to pastoral work at Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish in Clovis, NM with an outlying mission near the Texas border. His



cis Seminary... something about a funny prank orchestrated by Gino. Rick remarked that Gino's prank was not what inspired him to nominate Gino for this award, rather it was Gino's selfless, caring nature, as evidenced by his reaching out and befriending the most difficult kids at Sarah Fisher-St. Vincent de Paul Home for Children during his years at Duns Scotus College. The seeds of

next assignment was pastor of the Pueblo Indian Parish in Jemez Springs, NM. He was much loved and appreciated by his parishioners.

Even though Fr. Gino felt a strong calling to pastoral ministry, he accepted his next assignment to serve in Our Lady of Guadalupe (OLG) Province's formation and administration work for the next 17 years. He founded and

developed OLG's Postulancy Program. He did this for 4 years and involved the Postulants in ministry experience in Mexico. He was then asked to serve on the team of the first interprovincial, post-novitiate program in Chicago for 4 years. Fr. Gino served for several years on the Provincial Council and was ultimately elected OLG's Minister Provincial. During his time as provincial, Fr. Gino negotiated an exchange program in which Filipino Franciscan priests came to minister to Filipino teachers, nurses, and medical professionals who responded to US Federal Government requests to work on the Native American Reservations. During his 6 visits to the Franciscan Province in the Philippines, Fr. Gino formed relationships with families that live in the Payatas area of Manila. Payatas is the landfill area of Manila where the poorest of the poor live. Fr. Gino has stayed committed to a few families in the Payatas helping them build simple homes. Currently he is trying to assist them in starting poultry and pig farms to improve their situation and provide a source of steady income.

Last year Fr. Gino began another chapter in his Franciscan ministry by joining the Campus Ministry Team at the University of San Diego. Fr. Gino challenges both faculty and students to use their talents to serve their fellow human beings, especially the poor. He is also very grateful that his university income and stipends from helping at outly-

ing parishes on Sundays allow him to send some money each month to support the work in the Payatas. Fr. Gino served this past year as Visitator for the Philippine Province of San Pedro Bautista.

pastor at Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament Parish in Fort Defiance, AZ, as well as its missions at Sawmill and Navajo.

As Rick presented the Humanitarian Award to Fr. Gino, he thanked him for modelling St. Francis and Jesus so concretely and generously in our time by serving the people of God's Kingdom in such diverse and beautiful ways.

The Humanitarian Award was also presented to **Fr. Gilbert Schneider**, OFM, in recognition of his many years of pastoral work and outstanding leadership.

Within the Diocese of Gallup, he has served at Laguna, Zuni and St. Michael's. He has also served at Pena Blanca in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe. He was elected as Minister Provincial of Our Lady of Guadalupe Province, after which he returned to the Diocese of Gallup, where he serves as beloved



In the late 60's Fr. Gilbert, along with **Fr Denet Jung**, OFM, were instrumental in bringing the Search for Christian Maturity program to the Diocese of Gallup. This remarkable, inspirational program has helped

over 10,000 young people in the Diocese have a special encounter with Christ. In addition to his pastoral ministry work over the years, he has often served as Spiritual Director on weekends.



His sense of humor and humility go a long way in helping to bring people to a deeper relationship with Our Lord and His Church. He is always willing to stop what he is doing to help someone in need.

Fr. Gilbert Schneider recently celebrated 60 years as priest. The Franciscan Alumni Association presented a Humanitarian Award to him as a small token of appreciation for his dedication, talent, and many great contributions over the years.



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2016 Christian Life Award: Richard Rohr by Tom Shumate ('78)



The Franciscan Alumni Association annually presents the Christian Life Award to someone who exhibits the Franciscan charism of sharing the Gospel of Jesus and ongoing charity toward others.

This year, we present this award to **Fr. Richard Rohr**, who has had a profound impact on many people in this regard. From the founding of the New Jerusalem Community back in in the early 70s, to his founding of the Center for Action and Contemplation in Albuquerque in the mid-80s, through his teaching and his writings, and his interactions with many people, thousands of people

have been touched by Richard's work.

Fr. Larry Dunham, former Provincial Minister of Our Lady of Guadalupe Province, told of many letters that he received from individuals whose lives were touched and brought closer to Jesus through Richard's work.

In my work at Franciscan Media I can attest to the impact that his writings have had on others. For example, his best-selling 2011 book *Breathing Under Water: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps*, published by Franciscan Media, has impacted housands of lives. This is consistently the bestselling Franciscan Media book on Amazon.com.

A personal friend of mine credits Richard and this book

for saving his son's life. My friend relayed to me how his son, who continually struggled with drug addiction, was greatly affected and changed after listening to the audio version of *Breathing Under Water*.


A co-worker related to me that Richard's writings so impacted his life that when the opportunity presented itself, he and his family moved from Philadelphia to Cincinnati to work for the Franciscans.

Many of us can attest as well that we have been touched by God through Richard's work.

Richard's impact goes well beyond Catholic circles to many who seek a deeper relationship with God. Reaching other audiences including those of Rob Bell, Oprah Winfrey, the Dalai Lama, and others. I heard that when Richard wanted to retire from traveling and speaking engagements, he said that he would make an

> exception for the Dalai Lama. Subsequently he was invited to participate in the Festival of Faith in Louisville, Kentucky with the Dalai Lama, and did so!

St. Leonard Friary

As mentioned in the plan on page one for the 2017 FAA Chapter, all are invited to visit St. Leonard Church in Centerville, Ohio on Sunday of the reunion weekend. The following excerpts from Brown & White articles provide a little background on the "new campus" and how it came to be.

The Franciscan fathers of St. John the Baptist Province began working on a rather large project in the mid-1950s, a beautiful new theological seminary on a 250-acre tract of land in Centerville, Ohio. The number of vocations in the province has been increasing so rapidly that Oldenburg can no longer accommodate the number of clerics who come there.

On Sunday, May 31, 1959, the new Franciscan House of Theology was dedicated by the Minister General of the Franciscans, the Most Reverend **Augustine Sepinski**. After the dedication, Archbishop **Karl Alter** of Cincinnati celebrated the Solemn Pontifical High Mass. The new semi-

nary is named after St. Leonard of Port Maurice.

The main buildings include a three-story structure with the clerics' living quarters, a two-story library, and an assembly hall; another building with the clerics' classrooms, the refectory, and the brothers' living quarters; and a third unit housing the priests' living quarters and an administration wing.

The Speech Lab is a set of soundproof rooms where the Friars can practice sermons. All the practice rooms open onto a central room through a large plate glass window, where one person can supervise a number of speakers at once by means of an intercom system.

The chapel has a roof of unusual design, resembling a tufted cushion. The windows in the chapel are made of chunk glass, a form in which chunks of colored glass are embedded in concrete to form the pictures.

The beautiful campus, which can accommodate 100 friars and about 40 priests and brothers has been designed to serve best its purpose, the training of young men in the following of St. Francis — and to equip Franciscan priests for their work in the modern world.

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Disappearance of Fr. Orlando Jaquez — Mystery Solved!

Fr. Orlando (Anthony) Jaquez, OFM, class of '51, died in 2014. He was a Latin teacher who mysteriously disappeared from St. Francis Seminary during a fishing excursion in August 1964. He reappeared about 7 years later under another name, married, had children and a career. His daughter, Magnolia Wurgler (nee Tetreault), is piecing together the story of her father's "previous life as a Franciscan priest." She attended the alumni reunion in Albuguerque and presented the fascinating story of her dad.

Magnolia provided this additional information in a letter to J. D. Moya in April 2016:

He was ordained in 1960. St. Francis Seminary was his first assignment. After disappearing in 1964, he was neither seen nor heard from again, at least not in the circles of his family or the friary. Whatever happened between then and about 1971 when he met my mother is to me an untold story. This man, an insurance professional whom we knew as James M. Tetreault, just seemed to come from out of nowhere by all accounts of family and friends who made his acquaintance in the early seventies. My brother and I discovered his old IDs more than 18 years ago, but never dared to do more than speculate about their origin. He passed away in

2014 and in the time since, I have confirmed my family heritage, which led me to his one remaining sibling. They hadn't seen each other since 1947; it was incredibly healing for both of us to meet. I have also finally learned where



he got the name "Tetreault": his former classmate, Fr. Maynard (Michael) Tetreault! Fr. Maynard was gracious enough to return my recent phone call, and he filled in many blanks in the story of my father's previous life.

It is the life he lived afterward that compels me to see where he has been and to deepen my understanding of his calling. He was a truly great man, I'm sure that in many ways due to the influence of his time with the Franciscans. I have both a desire to visit his birthplace in New Mexico and to experience the fellowship of the Franciscan community. Perhaps I

could share the mystery of his disappearance and the peaceful ending to the story that came fifty years later.

Upon first hearing of this, Fr. Ric Schneider said, "What an amazing story! I was the last one to talk with Orlando before he left. I was gassing up the tractor when he asked if he could borrow my fishing gear. We found the gear along the Miami River after searching for many days. He left the car in a nearby parking lot."

As a student at the minor seminary, Tony Jaquez was a prolific writer and served as editor of the Brown and White during his senior year. He also wrote articles for Duns Scotus College's Assisian magazine while working on his bachelor's degree.

We wondered together how we might deepen and strengthen these Franciscan ties with one another. How can we open the dialogue with alums from the contemporary Franciscan formation programs to join in the joy and mission of this Francis-





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can "fraternity" of alums and their families? With the work of restructuring, how might we be a catalyst or bring together the alums and their families from the other provincial communities? Many of us felt that the Spirit of Francis is stirring something wondrous and creative in our midst. May God continue to lead us all! See you next year in Cincinnati!

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Rebuilding the Gazebo

A gazebo was built in the courtyard between the Seminary's garage and gymnasium a number of years ago.

The octagonal open-sided shelter is visible from most of the east-facing apartments at Mercy Franciscan at Winton Woods ... the rooms we might have known as our rec room, classroom or language lab. Despite the efforts of **Fr. Aubert Grieser**, to whom the structure was dedicated in 1992, the beauty of the surrounding grounds would never have come close to its current picturesque setting. Only in the worst weather will any visit not find somebody in the area, chatting with other residents, perhaps enjoying a picnic lunch.

In April, 2015, Mercy Franciscan Garden Club president Richard Eisele asked our organization to con-

sider taking on the job of replacing the roof on the little gazebo next to the garage, neither of us had a realistic expectation of the size of the project, but with the expert help and dedication of Dave Ackner, a resident retired contractor, we have provided a covering of plywood, roofing paper and wooden

shingles that may last another 50 years, or at least make the job a lot easier the next time it is needed.

The actual work for the project began on Friday, July 8th and continued through the weekend.

After nearly 25 years of sun, rain, snow, and ice, the single layer of cedar shakes nearly crumbled and fell off of their own accord. Pulling out the broken staples was tedious, but the teardown went with reasonable speed. The new shingles went on in fits and starts. The lower layers are mostly full-size shingles covering a lot of area, but as we approached the peak, each shingle needed to be be trimmed both for length and to fit the angle of the ridge. Thanks to Donn Wiley for doing most of the table-saw work.

As we started to run short of shingles on the final day, we became quite adept at using scrap pieces to fit some of those special, narrow ridge spots.

With most of the job complete by evening on Saturday July 16th, Dave continued to work on his own over the following weeks.

We're sure that Fr. Aubert would approve of his refurbished courtyard gazebo and especially the sweat equity that went into restoring it.

Thanks to all who participated in the project with expertise, materials, labor, transportation, and refreshments.
